  - Difficult to gauge or comment upon
  - Significant amount of events and volunteering opportunities have been cancelled due to COVID

  - GSC appears to be busy with similar engagement with GV office, however, still too early to make substantiated judgement.
- COVID Surge plan

  - Senior citizen programs are particularly vulnerable

    - Online poses many significant challenges that detract from the core intentions and benefits of volunteering

- Aiming to be a great stepping stone into further college engagement throughout University Hall and its different programs, as well as into other colleges.

- Discussed Ethan and Clare presenting on the subject of 'Student Life' and the importance of and where Volunteering fits into this.

UWA Residential College Engagement

- Ethan has been working on one of his main projects/aims for his 2022 tenure: increasing the UWA college engagement with University clubs and activities, with a particular focus on increasing the number of on-site volunteering opportunities at Colleges, hosted, or facilitated by Guild Volunteering.
- From meeting Ethan had with University Hall Leadership staff, Tony, and Ami, he is aiming to rekindle what was apparently a once strong collaboration between the Guild and Colleges and hoping to begin such through volunteering and GV.
- Ethan is also beginning to reach out to Heads of College to begin dialogue and seek opinions and ideas for possible collaboration opportunities.
- Ethan also notes that, particularly with an increasing number of international students returning to UWA colleges, there is a much greater population of student that tend to be very eager and engaged in volunteering. Furthermore, he notes that the winter break could be a great opportunity with many students often complaining of being idle, to make the most of available volunteering opportunities brought to college.
- Antonia notes she believes GV and UWA should look at opportunities to get students out in the community, to have a more inspirational experience by engaging beyond college with events not only in college, but also hosted outside with college students leaving college to attend.
- Ethan also notes possibly using Microvolunteering as a low-barrierto-entry beginning would be useful to introduce students to volunteering and encouraging further volunteering and passion along the way.
- Clare notes that from previous meetings with Emily (UniHall) that college residents are keen to take volunteers on trips elsewhere if opportunities do arise. Ethan adds that this would also allow for greater resource sharing, with colleges showing willingness to contribute to costs associated with opportunities and experiences that service their students.

## **Project Updates**

Wellbeing Volunteers

- Wellbeing volunteer's coordinator has stepped down
- However, have found new female coordinator who has extensive qualifications and has taken to the role well

<u>Intergen</u>

- Inter-generational volunteering
- Due to COVID-19, much of the Intergen program has been on hold as Residential Aged Care facilities had suspended external victors.
- Notes the program is currently working at ½ capacity with Chorus Group, a group centred around engaging young people with seniors

## Social Media for Good

- Two new program coordinators
- Clare is keen to continue overseeing and developing SMG
- Clare is also keen to engage volunteers early and looking to match them with non-for-profits and timely as possible. She also notes that to better ensure continued volunteer engagement and persistence throughout the program, trying to match volunteers with organisations they are passionate about is also an aim.
- Amitabh suggests possibly reaching out and advertising SMG to marketing students at UWA. This would allow for not only volunteering to occur, but for UWA students to gain professional skills and career-related experiences through volunteering. Notes that this would be a great value-add to the student experience.
- Antonia notes she is keen to create more structure and training with regard to the program as a whole, as well as marketing and social media management skills as a whole.
- Antonia also notes that SMH interns do not do ongoing social media management, rather pair with NFPs to improve their social media over a set period of time.
- Clare is keen to do more in-person training and meetings as COVID subsides, with a hope to do more team building activities also.

## **Staff Member Report**

National Student Volunteering Week

- Coming in May
- GV will run a series of events over the week
  - Will have a stall on Oak Lawn, community AUSMAP survey finding micro-plastics at the beach, general beach clean-up
  - Also exploring the possibility of doing a 'human library' event
    - Involves opening up and sharing a meaning moment (related to volunteering, for example) with a group of trusted peers
    - Renee is going to make an EOI form
- Communication planned and ready for week



## Results of GV Social Media Campaign

- Clare has worked with Caitlyn on a social media campaign for volunteering
- Reached over 25,000 people for only \$160
- Unsure how many will volunteer
- GV followers on social media accounts have continuously grown with over 52,000 'impressions'

## Marketing & Comms:

- Continuing to look into developing a marketing and communication guide
- Renee and Clare running a program of the month initiative
- Keen to keep tabs on social impact clubs as well as acknowledge their successes.

## 5. ALL OTHER BUSINESS

Volunteer Hour Recognition for Student Leaders

- Wish to recognise the significant and enormous hours of dedication and time students' representatives and leaders give to charities and clubs throughout UWA.
- Current hour-recording/recognition system does not recognise them
- Currently working with the UW Badging system; including leadership badges for program coordinators.
- GV Staff support Jack in applying for all club executives to be recognised with UWA badges, however, notes that the administration can be quite elaborate and cumbersome.
- Suggests that a form of application process needs to be implemented with set criteria.
- The issue of auditing such recognition for all clubs is a significant issue
- Antonia would like to sit down and discuss with Amitabh and Jak
- Antonia notes, once the University agrees, GV staff will be able to award badges to leaders
- Amitabh also notes that the current ERF system is significant lacking and having many issues (incorrect processing, won't be verified for ages, signatures are required and difficult to get, very inefficient process.) He notes such could reflect as a further difficulty on proofing and revising all badge applications.
- Ethan asks about retrospective/in-arrears recognition. Antonia suggests could probably only get 2021 recognised and unlikely.





- Amitabh asks what the major issues are
  - In response, Antonia notes that it is the approval processes. The process is confused and often unequal. Someone could do a significant amount of work, whilst another minimal, however, still under up receiving the same award and recognition.
  - SOC is also difficult due to its size. It is incredibly difficult to have all SOC clubs submit for awards, provide evidence of such, and then check each person and each submission.
  - Antonia suggests setting bare-minimum criteria's everyone needs to meet in order to be accepted.

## **Chair's Report**

Guild Volunteering x TedX (Second Update)

- Presenting a TedX style presentation centred around student life and "How can we give people more than a degree?"
- Unfortunately, plans have been derailed due to COVID
- Usually 8-12 weeks of speaker preparation, training, and rehearsals. However, COVID, absences and other logistical issues have led to downsizing of events and speakers and thus an inability to sufficiently accommodate
- Ethan has already begun discussions with TedX executive of possibly pivoting to have GV represented at the larger, end-of-year event
- It is a great networking event a good opportunity to showcase volunteering with a large (1000+) attendance of students and community members.





### UWA Residential College Engagement (Second Update)

- University Hall has been a successful testing ground for Microvolunteering events
  - Involved packing safe sex packs of the WA Aids Council (WAAC).
- First event had high attendance of 40-50 people with very positive feedback from UniHall staff and students alike.
  - Staff and students particular mentioned the activities' ability to bring people out of their rooms and encourage social interaction in a time of isolation.
- Unfortunately, due to COVID, the second event had to be cancelled, though has been reorganised on a regular basis at the next available time
- Given the success at UniHall, Ethan wishes to continue college outreach and aims to expand into other colleges
  - St. Catherine's College and St. George's College have been shown interest already
- Ethan has also noted his wish to continue and possibly expand event availability over winter given the large number of international student who will be in Perth and unable to leave due to COVID.

## PROSH

- GV is onboard to help as usual
- Working with PROSH Directors to organise role and functions of GV throughout the PROSH event

## **Project Updates**

WellBeans

- In transition period between coordinators
- Sarah is very new but very capable and enthusiastic
- Strong wishes for a recruitment/promotional 'blitz' of WellBeans
  - Serves dual purpose for recruiting more WellBeans as well as getting the WellBeans name out to SOCPAC clubs and other organisations that may benefit from their services throughout UWA
- Ethan is in discussions organising a SOCPAC presentation with Sarah to achieve the aforementioned
- Major upcoming event: RSD College Ball (Approx. 400 attendees)



Guild Gardens

- Friends of the Ground and Botany Annex
  - Enquiry and investigation continuing with the Friends of the Ground and Guild Garden team to explore possibility of expansion to Botany Annex
  - Significantly large space, increased flexibility of available and viable projects
  - Increased ability to engage a larger student group (particularly with Guild Gardens regularly being overbooked due to popularity)
  - Brynn has also noted that this could also create a social area in the Botany Annex which is notably empty and often unvisited.
- UWA Guild Gardens
  - Movement to a more floral focus
    - Allows for reduced water usage and increased aesthetic within the Guild
  - Hopeful shift to Botany Annex for more intensive planting and flora care
- Plant Sale
  - Very successful with positive reviews/popularity from students/staff
- Looking into setting up Guild Gardens Subcommittee/leadership team
  - In meetings with Ethan, Guild Gardens coordinator Brynn has mentioned to high workload, time commitment and future viability of the program as excellent rationale behind the establishment of a larger Guild Gardens group of 'Sub-coordinators'
  - Currently a 'Steering Group' exists which may continue at a larger scale

<u>Events</u>

- March and April Excursion reflection
- WA Marathon Club Assistance
  - Unfortunately cancelled due to COVID, however, contact has continued with support being requested at their next event to be held on the 1<sup>st</sup> of May or following event on the 15<sup>th</sup> of May.
- All events went very well this month with relatively high overall attendance and strong engagement.
  - Assisting Your Life to Achieve (April 8<sup>th</sup>), Beach Clean-up (April 14<sup>th</sup> at Cottesloe), Friends of Wireless Hill (April 26<sup>th</sup>) and Bicycle for Humanity (April 29<sup>th</sup>)
- Van capacity limits are proving somewhat difficult with more popular events

is boosted when self-transport is an easy option.

### SERAG (Swan Estuary Reserve Action Group)

- First event went very well
  - Highly rated and appraised for participants
- In the process of training a new coordinator as long-term coordinator is graduating
- Transition feedback and reflections have highlighted a strong need for increased marketing to ensure continued participation and program longevity.
- Possible need for a COVID/Isolation plan to be in place
  - Due to essentiality of coordinator and long-term organisation, COVID sickness and absence can significantly impact the program. Thus, a back-up coordinator or plan in place would be of benefit.

#### <u>Intergen</u>

- General COVID update
  - COVID has significantly hindered the program with nursing homes being shut to outside visitors
  - This has led to significantly reduced volunteering opportunities and ability for student groups to interact or be of meaningful benefit.
- Advocare
  - Unfortunately, there has also been a reduced in student interest over the COVID period. This can be attributed to the lack of in-person interaction and disruption as a result of COVID as well as the need for consistent and quite high weekly commitment
  - Due to COVID, the program also was unable to start in the first week of semester which is often a critical time for volunteer engagement.
    - This has been highlighted as an opportunity in Semester 2 to ensure effective, early-semester engagement.
- Chorus
  - Regular weekly volunteering has been going very well with highly engaged and interested volunteers
  - Mostly interactive, meaningful sessions
    - Chorus staff even happy to prepare activities for the team, so they can just facilitate and interact with the elderly
  - o Issues
    - Although volunteers are engaged and enjoying, there is a limited total number





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• Thursday timing has been strongly attributed to be a bad day

for many Uni students, however, is one of the only days Chorus can currently provide

- Lack of advertising to recruit sufficient volunteers
- Letter Writing with Brightwater
  - Opportunity for those who can't make it to chorus (busy on Thursday) to do this activity as an alternative
  - Provides an alternative back-up program in response to COVID and uncontrolled inabilities to access nursing homes.
  - Brightwater wants letters written to older people about how days are at UWA, how we study, relax, what we do, what we study etc. – like a weekly update
  - Hoping to have skype call with group of seniors and Intergen to discuss and become familiar with team

• The aim of these stalls is to let students directly see what organisations are available to volunteer at both at and through UWA, as well as get a real idea of what goes on in such organisations and how they can make a genuine difference.

Guild Volunteering x TedX (Semester 2 Re-Try)

- Beginning follow-up, discussion, and organisation process for aforementioned large-scale end-of-year event.
- Ethan has been in communication with new secretary after a change over a committee throughout Semester 1.
- TedX is still very much interested in having Ethan present on volunteering, its benefits to students and how it can be a part of student life.
- Ethan has been in discussions to be a part of the main TedX event of a year which attracts up to 2000 members of the student community and public. Ethan also notes this is a great two-pronged opportunity to engage with students and our target population as well as to raise awareness and visibility of Guild Volunteering to possible charitable and community organisations in need.

UWA Residential College Engagement (Semester 2)

- Ethan has continued outreach to each UWA college from last month and last semester
- There has been quite a positive enquiry responses from St. Catherine's and St. George's, interested in expanding their volunteering opportunities and breadth. There has been minimal interest from Trinity, possibly due to existing programs. UniHall has served as an excellent starting example for the success and engagement of residents.
- Ethan is continuing to reach out to Lead RAs of St. Catherine's, St. Thomas More and St. George's to see where best to begin organising an event.
- Ethan has also been in preliminary discussions with the President of University Hall's Residents Club to explore possibly hosting a College Volunteering Day centred at University Hall. Other colleges will then be able to come to University Hall and explore the available volunteering opportunities and organisations present on the day.

#### Guild Gardens

- Current acting coordinator, Bryn, has had to stepdown from his position
  - He is, however, still very much keen to stay a part of the group, possibly as a Steering Group member
- Steering Group Formation

  - The steering group will ultimately provide a level of student leadership to help support and grow this program. Particularly given its time intensive nature, having multiple leaders collaborating together will ensure no event needs to be postponed or run short due to COVID or other absences.
  - This will also allow for larger events at a greater scale to be run, accommodating for more students with an often full waiting list.

#### <u>Intergen</u>

- Induction to new members and the nursing home has been completed
- Planning processes and sessions have begun to prepare and organise the group and its activities for the coming semester.
- The first sessions this semester will be this Friday (29<sup>th</sup>)
  - This will be held at Regis Nedlands in coordination with Advocare on a regular Friday morning basis each week. The venue has a capacity of just over 100 rooms, ensuring a large number of residents can be helped.

volunteering to be continued and not effected by COVID, however, also ensure residents are not worried about the possibility of infection.

- $\circ$  10 student volunteers will be able to attend each session.
- We are currently unsure if this will be possible to convert into a long-term venture, however, we are looking into this possibility, or potential pivot to café trips with elderly residents or other potential projects.
- Possible idea: Bring certain aged care residents to campus after semester to allow for a trip out of the home they spend most of their time in, as well as experience modern university life which they take great joy from hearing about through discussions.

## <u>SMFG</u>

- SMFG has officially been handed over to Renee
- This semester saw a fantastically high number of application, however, far more than was able to be accommodated.
- An Info Session stage has been incorporated into the recruitment process, resulting in a halving of the number of applications through design brief
  - Halved number of applications through design brief
- Training sessions have been organised involving external organisations coming into UWA to host a training session for all recruited members. The organisation has previously worked with VWA in creating volunteer-based websites and so has strong experience in the area.
- Partners for semester 2 will remain the same as semester 1 through reengagement as delivery and engagement was not adequately possible throughout semester 1 due to COVID.
- Noted issues:
  - There was a limited number of individuals that turned up to the training sessions.
  - It was noted that the application process, although serving its purpose to delineate the most apt volunteers, may have been too stringent, leaving too few recruits for a successful program.
- A significant hurdle to overcome is reputational risk. Given the published nature of websites and their creation by UWA students, if volunteers drop off after working with an organisation for 1-2 weeks, this will have negative impacts both on the Guild Volunteering reputation as well as UWA as a whole.





## Bread Run

- A new coordinator, Jolin, has recently taken over the BreadRun program starting from today.
- The BreadRun program will continue to run weekly bread pick-up and drop-up rounds in collaboration with local bakeries on drop off points in UWA.
- Currently looking into possible expansion avenues both in and out of UWA with Ethan reaching out to stakeholders in UWA to expand distribution points, as well as external organisations that could provide additional donations in the event of expansion to meet supply.

## <u>PROSH</u>

- We are in the process of recruiting much needed volunteers to help out on the day of PROSH.
- Writers' nights have been going very well so far with continuous content being generated in great amounts.
- Classes have been confirmed to be cancelled on the Wednesday of PROSH.
- PROSH Gala night has also been confirmed as a major engagement night, as well as the running of PROSH Olympics. All of which hopefully works to raise an even greater amount of money.

## **Building Bridges**

- Final event held in June, culminating with the last of four leaderships days run by Assets.
- This event involved booking out the Shakespeare theatre to run a 'Graduation ceremony'.
- The event and program as a whole went very well. All volunteers were fantastic and highly committed lasting the entire duration of the year.
- GV would love to work with Assets again if they do apply for another grant to work with young people.

## **Project Updates**

BreadRun

- Review of BreadRun distribution expansion and focus on students in need
  - All newly established distribution points (International Student Lounge, Robert Winkler Clinic, Guild Student Centre) are fully functioning and producing fantastic results (no bread wastage and usage before the next delivery).
  - EN notes positive feedback has also been received regarding the impact the supplies for bread to those who need it most have been having. Notably, international students under financial hardship (ISL) and members of the community experieicng financial difficulty (Robin Winkler).
- Future expansions, both internally and externally
  - EN notes his intention and current planning with Jolin to expand the current BreadRun program after a successful expansion in the two new sites to further sites across UWA, as well as expanding to potential external charities.
  - EN notes this included current supply site recruirtment and expansion to ensure continued and sufficient donation supply. It also included reaching out to external organisations, estbalishing where genuine needs are, and establishing means to effectively undertake off-site deliveries to locations such as Homeless shelters, Soup Kitchens etc.
  - RN suggested to begin chatting with established Food Banks around Perth and potentially make GV one of their distributors.
- AJ brought up the potential for frozen food to also be included in the delivery process, or, as a means of preservation to prevent food wastage

## Volunteering Awards

- The awards include all UWA students that volunteer either with Guild Volunteering directly, or, through recognised clubs or organisations.

- Nominations are current live with links on the Guild Volunteering Facebook page and Instagram

Program Coordinator Recruitment

## Sustainable Fashion Week Recap (19th to 28th September)

- Event Recap
  - Slow Fashion Market & Panel (Sep 28<sup>nd</sup>)
    - Highlighting sustainability and a circular economy in fashion at all levels and price points.
    - Included external vendors: Good Sammies, Vinnies and Anglicare and Local sustainable designers: WRIGHT, Systems, Object House, Pure Apparel, Volim & Spiral Wetsuits
    - The event turned out to be very busy with a significant number of students engaging with the event.
    - All involved external parties were very happy with the turnout and impact that was able to be made.
  - o Panel
    - Unfortunately, the panel was not as popular as other events. Students did not seem overly engaged or driven to stay and listen, nor interact with the panel.
    - Positive feedback was received from those who did engage, noting they enjoyed the insights from industry professionals on current happenings, events and area movements.
  - Microvolunteering x Relay For Life (Sep 19th)
    - Collaboration creating scrunchies out of recycled fabric to sell as fundraisers for Relay for Life 2023
    - The event was very successful with all items made being sold as they were made on the day
    - CM notes there is a possibility for tweaking this event in the future to ensure there is a greater number of sewing machines present and thus an ability to make a greater number of products to sell.



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- CM also notes there is a lot of raw material leftover that can be nt in the future
- used for another event in the future.
- CM noted that the event also seemed to engage new members of the community from all areas of UWA.
- Fashion Repair Lab (Sep 20<sup>th</sup>)
  - Event centred around encouraging students to repair their favourite clothes & jewellery and reduce consumer-culture 'use and throw'.
  - The event was incredibly popular with a large portion of the College community with a very successful turnout and impact result.
    - Lines arose almost immediately
    - CM notes that K Common was definitely a good choice of central location to attract foot traffic, as well as those coming from dinner.
  - UniHall has expressed interested in possibly making a regular event out of the Repair Café
    - EN notes this could be a potneital long term opportunity for volunteering engagement with colleges, as well as an overall engagement of an often untouched college student community.
    - EN also notes the potential for such events to also be used as an opportunity to provide upskilling to attending UWA students through voluntary sewing workshops and more.
    - EN continues that there the potneital for expansion across college row would be a beneficial initiative to look into next year. He adds that this is the same for multiple volunteering opporuntiteis, such as the successful Microvolunteering events at UniHall.
- Dress for Success Donation Drive (Ongoing)
  - Donate your unwanted new or nearly-new professional attire to help out women working towards financial independence
  - This has had a moderately well level of success with donations gradually coming in. However, as an ongoing project, further evaluations will need to be done in order to measure success.

- SC adds that she was unaware the SFW was organised by Guild Volunteering.
  - SC notes that the advertising, although great, could have been clearer in advertising that Guild Volunteering were the main organisers. This would also be good as to give credit to Guild Volunteering
  - CM responds that the Guild Volunteering Logo was included in every advertisement but that the Guild Volunteerign name was not overtly advertised along with it
    - CM continues that SC makes a good point and that future advertising should be made more obvious. Advertising may have gone too far on subtly.

## Grand Challenges Eat Up Session

- Sustainable development week coming up
  - Run by the same key individuals and working groups as Grand Challenges
  - Focused on advocating and contributing to the UN Sustainable Development Goals
- GV to do Eat Up Session
  - Eat up is an NFP that does large volunteering sessions
    - The organisation makes thousands of sandwhiches and packed lunches each week
    - Eat up then pakes them in takeaway containers and freezes them. When needed, the frozen meals are then taken to low-socioeoen schools in Perth Metro for distribution to students.
    - The Eat Up session will be a collaboration with PSA
  - The event is set to be held on October 11<sup>th</sup> (Tuesday)

Media and Communications

- Overall social media on all accounts have done reasonably well this month with the main KPIs and targets being met.
- A photoshoot has taken place with newly arrived shirts and merchandise.





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## Program Updates and Feedback

- Intergen
  - Regis partnership update
    - The program and partnership has been running well
    - However, CM note that GV does not want to partner with Regis in the future. CM adds that they are too difficult to organise and collaborate with, as well as want overly structured attendences and confirmation of attendence prior to event.
    - CM notes this is too much of a task and that students do not operate in this manner, particularly in voluntary roles.
    - Furthermore, CM notes compsulsory induction sessions make it difficult for students to immediately participate
    - CM notes she prefers to go somewhere that is more casual and lenient
      - May be other age care facilities that are more in need
      - POtntially look at different partner urther away that is more in need
  - SC asks whether or not companionship si still more importsnt, despite the challenges. However, she also acknowledges Regis does have significant funding and thus activities provided may already be highly stimulating. She also adds that such activities are often not run in less well-off aged care homes, referring to CM's point of swapping to a partner in more need.
  - EN notes that he believes it is important for GV to focus its fantastic efforts to causes and organisations that need us most. As such, although GV's partnership with Regis does have benefit, a potential partnership shift could produce greater benefit to the community and more meaningful volunteering to the UWA students.
  - JO adds that she believes the GV team should go with their gut; if the feeling, interactions and volunteers aren't positive and achieving set out goals then it is worthwhile looking for better opportunties elsewhere.
- Guild Gardens
  - The first Guild Gardnes sessions is happening on the 30<sup>th</sup> of September.
  - CM notes that great interest has been present, with previous events booking out.

  - The entirety of the EMAS event went very well.
  - WellBeans coordinators Sarah and Emily note that the EMAS committee was very well organised and included WellBeans in pre-event briefing sessions.
