## DISCUSSION TOPICS

### 1. Higher Education Funding

Simon Birmingham, Minister for Education, has announced that he intends to cut approximately \$2 billion from the University Sector. This can be done without approval of the Federal Government because the proposed cut is through decreases to the funding of equity pathways and ancillary programs to universities. It is likely that these cuts will mean a decrease in the services provided by UWA, including equity programs such as Fairway and Aspire UWA and lead to reduced quality of Education due to the decrease in resources available to the University. I am eager to hear the position of each Faculty Society on this budget changes, and suggestions to how we, as an Education Council, can campaign for the retention of funding to the University sector.

### Monthly Update

- Apologies from Karen and Marissa, who are currently travelling in St Lucia and Barcelona respectively. The wonderful Lianne and Benjamin are our proxies for this meeting, who are both members of the 2018 WAMSS Executive.
- Congratulations to our graduating students, the inaugural MD cohort, who have just officially become doctors! We are incredibly excited for them and wish WA's newest doctors all the very best for their careers as interns and beyond. Grad Week was a huge success, featuring Graduation Dinner (attended by various Faculty members), Pre-Intern Conference, and a celebratory breakfast.
- Board of Examiners has now been held for all cohorts, and students have officially been notified of their results as Friday 15<sup>th</sup> December. Students who are required to sit supplementary exams have been notified, and remediation will run over the next few weeks. The relevant year representatives have established secret Facebook groups for students to support each other and communicate in the lead up to these exams.
- Student representatives from WAMSS were invited to attend MD Forum, a day of planning, discussion and reflection run by the Faculty. Rhiannon Hicks (2017 President) and Samantha White (2017 VP Internal) also presented on the student perspective. With the first cohort of MD students graduating, current issues with the MD and evaluation results were discussed. Other topics included the ongoing development of the revised MD course, student wellbeing and welfare, clinical placements and assessments.
- Third years are off to their international electives over the next two months – an exciting endeavour! There have been some ongoing issues with communication and administrative aspects, but we are working with the Faculty to ensure these are resolved for next year.
- Planning for 2018 is well underway – Orientation Camp is scheduled for 3-4 February, and the EMP has been approved! Well done to Charlie Lefroy and Gavin Huangfu, our Orientation Representatives, for all of their hard work. We have begun work on revamping the WAMSS website to



make it more user-friendly, Allied Health has a venue locked in, planning for our Annual Medical Gala Dinner has begun...next year is going to be brilliant!

### **Current and Ongoing Issues**

- The first year of the revised MD course begins in January 2018. The majority of the MD1 course has been finalised, with continuing work on assessment, timetabling and other details. Orientation, previously a 2-week introduction, will now be a one-day event on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of January, and WAMSS will be presenting. We are in the process on confirming details of this, the Unimenter link-up; and importantly mechanisms for student representation and feedback.
- Following ongoing feedback about the quality and organisation of clinical placements, Samantha White put together a survey which has been distributed to all clinical students (MD2, MD3 and MD4). We will review the results of this and present these to the Faculty in a letter in early 2018.
